Caring for One Another at St Thomas'

At St Thomas', we aim to be a church growing in love—love that's seen in acts of care and compassion. Pastoral care is not just the role of staff; it's the shared responsibility of the whole church community, as we seek to reflect God's love in practical ways.

Scripture calls us to care for one another:

- "Bear one another's burdens" (Galatians 6:2)
- "Encourage one another and build each other up" (1 Thessalonians 5:11)

What is Pastoral Care?

Our Pastoral Care Plan centres on Care and Connection—offering spiritual, practical, and social support for people facing challenges, questions, or change.

- Pastoral Care: provided by trained individuals or staff (e.g. visits, prayer, support in grief or crisis).
- Connection: everyday care offered by fellow members through small groups, meals, practical help, and prayer.

Small Groups are a vital part of this plan, as those who share life together are often best placed to support one another. However, not all needs can be met within groups—which is why our Care and Connection Coordinators are available to step in when needed.

We also recognise that everyone has different capacities and resources. Our goal is to provide fair and realistic care that's sustainable and reflects our values.


To promote small group membership to the church community: Our service leaders, particularly those who serve on Parish Council, have shared testimonies on the positive impact that small group membership has on their lives including encouragement, spiritual and personal growth, friendship and community. We encourage all members of St. Tom's to be part of a small group. Susie Carrick and Paula Adams are our small group coordinators, their contact details are located in the lounge.

Hold a community event: The "Who's Coming to Lunch" event has been scheduled for Sunday 15th June following the 10am service. We are delighted this will be a whole of church event with both Chinese speaking services meeting at 10am to join in lunch. This is an opportunity to develop closer connections and friendships with members of our Church. Manythanks to Fiona Dowling and her small group for facilitating.

Rejuvenation of Welcome Ministry: Providing a warm welcome to newcomers is a characteristic of a healthy and growing church! Parish Council has identified rejuvenation of our welcome ministry as a priority and has invested in new vertical banners to highlight the entrance to each worship space and is holding a welcomer's training session on Thursday 26th June to cover responsibilities and new initiatives. Thankyou to John and Cathy Altmann's small group for recently hosting a newcomer's lunch. We are investigating wayfinding signage in the car park and courtyard to guide people to the church entrance.

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In my first year at St Tom's, way back in 2016, I attended Equipping Priests In Charge: a two-year course facilitated by Sandy Jones on behalf of Melbourne Diocese. In one of my first sessions,

Steve Webster (former Vicar of St Michael's North Carlton) presented on starting well in a new parish. Steve was a veteran Vicar; I greatly respected his insights and practical advice. One piece of Steve's advice that I acted on was to do a series on Paul's letter to the Ephesians. The reason Steve gave was simple - Ephesians provides us with a vision of what the Church is and in this sense it explains who we are, as a church.

That was nine years ago.



There are many other books of the Bible we have not had a series on, so a fair question would

be, Why are we doing Ephesians again? The short answer is that it was requested by last year's Parish Council. Behind that request was a similar rationale that Steve Webster gave. In the latter months of 2024, after our revision day, the Parish Council perceive that St Tom's needed to recall what the Scriptures say about the church to help us reconnect with the grand vision given to us. A series on Ephesians was suggested as a response to this need.

As with all Scripture, we read it and re-read it. This is what it means to meditate on Scripture. God's word is sustenance for our spiritual life as a community. We will never stop learning from the Bible and growing in Christ.

- ¹ Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. ² He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished. ³ The tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread."

what did St Tom's think

With my group, it's been a wonderful time to study the Gospels together.

Focusing on Christ gives us a real example for how to live each day, as we all want to be more like Jesus.

In Luke's Gospel, what stands out to me is Jesus' humanity. His love for sinners and those on the margins, like tax collectors and fishermen, regardless of their status or background.

This reminds me that if I want to follow Jesus, I have no right to judge or discriminate, because He never did.

I was surprised by how strongly Luke highlights Jesus' care for women and the poor.

We also noticed how much Luke talks about wealth, especially in stories like Zacchaeus and the widow's coins.

The woman who touched the hem of Jesus' garment and how she was healed by a miracle, not by medicine.

I really appreciate reading the whole Gospel from start to finish, not skipping over the tricky bits, because it challenges us to think deeply and honestly.

Studying the Gospels this way has helped me grow in faith and see Jesus' example more clearly in my own life.

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
